




January 2021



Pope Francis asks us to pray for persecuted Christians

"Today, let us pray for those suffering persecution because of the name of Jesus. They are many, unfortunately. There are more than in the beginning of the Church. Let us entrust these brothers and sisters to the Madonna, that they might respond with meekness to oppression and that, as true witnesses to Jesus, they might conquer evil with good."

New Year's message from Pope Francis

Holy Mass for the Solemnity of Mary, the Most Holy Mother of God, was celebrated on the morning of New Year's Day by Cardinal Secretary of State Pietro Parolin, standing in for Pope Francis, who is suffering a painful attack of sciatica.

The Pope said, "while we hope for new beginnings and new cures, let us not neglect *care*. Together with a vaccine for our bodies, we need a vaccine for our hearts. That vaccine is care." He added, "This will be a good year if we take care of others, as Our Lady does with us." At the first Christmas, the shepherds, led by grace, found God, not "in miraculous signs, but in a simple family." We, too, need grace to find Jesus; and once we have found Him, "we must not lose sight of Him." In this new year, we are called, like the shepherds, to be active in order to receive grace. In this new year, Pope Francis said, "it would be good to *find time for someone*." "Time is a treasure that all of us possess," he continued, but that we often guard jealously. Instead, "Let us ask for the grace to find time for those who need someone to listen and show concern for them." He said, "If we can find time to give, we will be amazed and filled with joy, like the shepherds."



PASTORAL LETTER OF THE RIGHT REVD ALAN HOPES BISHOP OF EAST ANGLIA

To be read at all Masses December 26/27 2020

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

I wish you all a truly blessed and joyful Christmas!

The headlines in the newspapers last Sunday announced that Christmas had been cancelled! This was due to the fact that many parts of our country have been moved into higher tiers for the foreseeable future in order to stop the Covid virus from spreading.

Life has certainly changed since we celebrated Christmas last year! We have been, and still are living through a time of great uncertainty and fear in the midst of this pandemic. In spite of all the challenges, the human suffering and the tragic loss of loved ones over the past year, we, as the Church, have never ceased to proclaim the Good News of the love, hope and joy which the Incarnation of the Son of God brings to our world.

This Christmas, like every Christmas, calls us once again to proclaim, both through our lives and through our words, the Angel's message: Do not be afraid...I bring you good news of great joy..... a saviour has been born for you: he is Christ the Lord.

Do not be afraid!

In that small baby, born in a stable and placed in a manger, surrounded by the love and devotion of his Mother Mary and protected by his foster father Joseph, God, the creator of all things, has entered into our human history.

Jesus Christ is truly "Emmanuel", God-with-us, sharing in our humanity in all its frailty. He has experienced life as we experience it, with all its joys and sorrows. He knows too all our needs.

Do not be afraid!

Jesus Christ is truly God among us, healing our wounds, strengthening us in our weaknesses, consoling us in our sadness. He comes to redeem and to enrich our humanity in order to show us the way to heaven and to eternal life.

This is the reason for our joy and our hope as we celebrate Christmas and acknowledge the presence of the Incarnate God, both in human history and in our lives, not just at Christmas, but in each and every day and in each and every moment of our lives.

We do not know what all the consequences of this global pandemic might be. We do know, however, that there will be many challenges ahead of us before the world is restored to a new kind of normality. Many will have to face the challenges of unemployment, sickness, the death of a loved one, homelessness and poverty. Our local parishes must be there to support and encourage all who find themselves in such a situation. But we cannot just rely on human abilities and powers to find the solution for these challenges.




May we all be at peace within ourselves and the outer world and may we live in the present within us where God is and resides.. we are all ONE through God's eternal love
